Legislative Report

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The 2014 General Assembly Session adjourned sine die on March 8 without approving a budget. During the 2014 legislative session, 2888 bills were introduced in the General Assembly. VDOT tracked 228 bills that directly or indirectly impacted VDOT. Budget Bills HB 29 and HB 30 both failed during the regular session. The Governor called a Special Session to address the budget. After much deliberation, the Governor signed Budget Bill HB 5002 (2014-2016) on June 23, 2014. The following pages highlight some legislation of interest that was enacted into law, carried over or failed to pass by the 2014 General Assembly. Unless otherwise noted, all bills enacted into law have an effective date of July 1, 2014.

The regular session resulted in the passage HB 311, which creates Title 33.2 (Highways and Other Surface Transportation Systems) as a revision of existing Title 33.1 (Highways, Bridges and Ferries), as well as portions of Titles 15.2 (Counties, Cities and Towns), 56 (Public Service Companies), and 58.1 (Taxation). Title 33.2 consists of 32 chapters divided into four subtitles: Subtitle I (General Provisions and Transportation Entities); Subtitle II (Modes of Transportation: Highways, Bridges, Ferries, Rail, and Public Transportation); Subtitle III (Transportation Funding and Development); and Subtitle IV (Local and Regional Transportation). According to the Virginia Code Commission, the bill organizes the laws in a more logical manner, removes obsolete and duplicative provisions, and improves the structure and clarity of statutes pertaining to highways, bridges, ferries, rail and public transportation, transportation funding, and local and regional transportation.
